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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY- SWOC ANALYSIS OF GOVERNMENT COLLEGE NEDUMANGAD

A long cherished dream of the people of Nedumangad Taluk came true when in response to the request by the popular college sponsoring committee, the Government accorded sanction for starting a Government college as per G.O (Rt)1760/81/H.Edn. dt.26/8/1981. The area, which the college is meant to serve, has a very high economic potential but is educationally backward. The university sanctioned affiliation to two batches of PDC, one with World History, Indian History and Economics as optional subjects and the other with Full Commerce. The college started functioning on 28-08-1981. Prof. K Sreedharan Nair took charge as principal on the FN of 28-08-1981. The college was inaugurated by the then Chief Minister of Kerala Sri E K Nayanar on the 16th September 1981 at a colourful function in which a large number of students, parents and the public participated. Classes were started on 22nd September 1981.

During the 32 years of its existence, the college has won distinctions in curricular aspects and in the field of sports and cultural activities. As a result of the cooperation from all quarters, the sponsoring committee has succeeded in procuring land and constructing buildings for the college at akkottupara, about 1 Km away from the heart of the town. The college started functioning in the new site from the third term of 1989-90 and the buildings were formally inaugurated by the Chief Minister of Kerala on 14-02-1990. In 1991-92 after prolonged request from PTA, students and staff, University sanctioned B. Com course with 50 students to our college. This changed the standards of the college. The high success in conducting B. Com classes, University had no hesitation to sanction other degree classes. During 1993-94 a batch of B.A. History and in the next year a batch of B.A. Economics has been sanctioned. These years witnessed a lot of changes in curricular and extracurricular activities. NSS and club activities are functioned very effective. In the Inter University level, the college makes its own name in arts and sports.

The high success rate of graduate courses and the delinking of pre-degree forced the Government to sanction the post graduate courses. In 1998-99 one batch of M.A History and in 1999-2000 one batch of M. Com have been sanctioned to this college.

2005 B Sc Physics with Computer Application has been started in this college. In 2012, B A Malayalam and B Sc Mathematics were started in our college. The students of our college secured First Rank in M A History(in 2007) and Third Rank in M A History(in 2012), in the University examination.

The College aims to mould the student community hailing mostly from the marginalized and weaker sections of the society into better individuals, and guide them to contribute constructively towards national goals by upholding the values of secularism, national integration and social commitment. This college has been included in the list of colleges prepared under section 2-(f) of the UGC Act 1956 and is eligible to receive assistance in terms of the rules formed under section 12-B of the UGC Act as per letter No.F-8-7(07) CPPT dt.25-06-1997. 75% of our students are covered under the scholarship programmes like State Merit Scholarship, Single Girl Child Scholarship, Post Matric Scholarship, Suvarna Jubilee Merit Scholarship and C H Muhammedkoya Scholarship. The primary objective of the institution is to enable the students to cope with the demands of the contemporary global scenario through effective transaction of the curricular and co-curricular aspects. Academic excellence, personality development and social orientation are our guiding principles. We strive to develop a strong foundation of ethical principles in our students and make them academically excellent to acquire global competencies with the help of technology, so that they can substantially contribute to national development.

The strength of the institution is its qualified and committed faculty members, industrious administrative staff, state of the art infrastructure, well equipped college library with INFLIBNET facility, interactive smart classes, high speed Wi-Fi internet access 24/7, EDUSAT facility, availability of computers in a student ratio of 1:4, Digital Language Lab, UGC Network Resource Centre, Centralized Computing Facility, facilities for scanning, printing and copying, the various programmes and cells funded by UGC and state government, good academic ambience and the enthusiastic students. The college has always been in the frontline in fulfilling its social objectives in terms of educational attainments and producing quality individuals. CBCS (Choice Based Credit and Semester) has been introduced with special focus on programme structure, grading and weightage. Two internal assessment exams on the prescribed University question model are conducted in each Invited lectures seminars and workshops are conducted for the academic semester. enrichment of the students and faculty members. Faculty members are deputed for refresher courses, orientation programmes and other training programmes periodically. Field trips, industrial visits and study tours are conducted in tune with the curriculum. ICT is incorporated and interactive class rooms are set up for effective transaction of the curriculum.

The weak points of our institution are the occasional shortage of permanent teachers for certain subjects. We do not have sufficient number of PG programmes and it weakens our efforts to fulfill our academic commitment to the community. Besides, the college is not a research centre.

The opportunities ahead of us are many. We have been submitting proposals for more academic programmes, and we have received vocal assurance from the Hon. Minister for Education Sri. Abdu Rub for the sanction of more courses from the academic year 2014-15. We also hope to elicit more funding from different agencies for infrastructural enhancement and academic projects. We strive to sustain our student support activities and improve the quality of our services.

The challenges ahead of us are diverse. We need to assure better financial assistance for the successful accomplishment of our future projects. Continuous enhancement of infrastructure, proper maintenance, improving the quality of academic services, extension, research activities and student support programmes are a few of the challenges ahead. The college is confident that it can sustain and improve its services to the students and the general public in the coming years.

- 1. CBCSS is introduced to the fresher's with special focus on programme structure, evaluation, grading, weightage and credits.
- 2. All departments are equipped with technical support in the form of smart class facility, laptops, scanners, printer and WI-FI connection Section.
- 3. Sufficient supplementary reading materials like books, journals, magazines and other periodicals are provided.
- 4. Students are encouraged to use digital sources, internet and INFLIBNET for collecting information.

- 5. Projects/Assignments and seminars are given regularly to promote self study in students.
- 6. Orientation classes for university examinations and two model exams are conducted in each semester to familiarize the students with the pattern of examination and to equip them to manage the given time effectively.
- 7. Invited lectures, Seminars and Workshops are conducted for the academic enrichment of the students and faculty members.
- 8. Debates, Quiz competitions and discussions etc. are conducted by the college to compliment the effective translation of the curriculum.
- 9. Question Banks are prepared in each department for the reference of students and faculty members.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

To network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university for effective operationalization of the curriculum the institution organised the following programmes.

- 1. The P.G Department of commerce made tie up with Geojith security consultancy regarding security trading, derivative trading and online trading.
- 2. The department of physics conducted a seminar on "Material Science and Characterization" which created a platform for students and teachers to interact with the experts in concerned research fields.
- 3. The department of commerce conducted a two day national seminar on "Recent Trends in Banking Sector".
- 4. Career seminars are organized to orient students towards new job avenues, and they help students to focus on special aspects of the curriculum as per the requirements of their job preferences.
- 5. Feedbacks from students and teachers are collected and representation is made in the academic council, syndicate and other bodies of the university, and required changes are suggested in the curriculum design.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?(number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

The institution systematically documents and analyses both teacher and student feedback on course and curriculum. Based on the efficient feedback the institution identifies the corrective measures such as modernization of syllabus, lack of reference materials, irrelevant content and other aspects of pedagogy. Adequate space is provided for interaction among academic partners. The representatives of the institution present the views to the bodies responsible for designing of syllabus and curriculum. The syllabus of these programmes is designed in such a way that it specifically caters to the needs of the students. The strengths and weaknesses of the students are analyzed initially before consolidating the structure of the syllabi each year. The courses are fashioned with a view to increase the skills and employability of students. The departments concerned and the coordinators of the programmes work together for the syllabus design.

Range of Core /Elective options offered by the University and those opted by the college.

There are six degree programmes conducted under CBCSS and two PG programmes in this college. Each of the programmes offered here opens up a number of job opportunities and makes the students eligible for higher studies in the disciplines concerned.

Department of mathematics

This programme is unique among all other similar undergraduate mathematics programmes of the parent university. This course has Physics and computer science as complementary papers instead of statistics subject so that the students who have undergone this course will get a chance to pursue higher studies in mathematics as well as in computer science. Apart from the conventional opportunities of mathematics graduates these students can advance their career in software field also. The programme includes 13 core courses, 4 complementary courses, 2 foundation courses, 4 additional language courses, 5 language courses, 1 open course and a project.

Department of History

Department of History offers B A and M A History programmes which would open a wide variety of Job Opportunities and a comprehensive understanding of the history of the society we all in habit. The syllabus is modified to meet the modern theoretical approaches to history and to introduce different dimensions of historical research. BA history programme includes 17 core courses, 8 complementary courses, 4 additional language courses, 5 language courses, 2 open courses, 2 foundation courses and 1 project work. M A history has 4 courses in each semester and a project in the final semester.

Department of Commerce

The Department of Commerce offers B. Com and M. Com programmes which give an exposure to the students to the recent developments in management and accounting practices.

B. Com programme includes 6 semesters having 16 core courses, 4 complementary courses, and 4 language courses, 2 open courses, 4 electives, 2 foundation courses and 1 project work. M Com programme offers specialization in Financial Management and has four courses in each semester. The programme has

four semesters and demands seminars, project works and assignments. The syllabi of both these programmes have been revised by the university as per the requirements of the learners which enable them to understand the dynamic changes in the business environment and to undertake their own business activities, understand the various aspects of management and develop administrative skills.

Department of Economics

Department of economics offers BA programme in Economics with Political science and History as complementary subjects. The programme includes 14 core courses, 8 complementary courses, 1 open course, 2 foundation courses, 6 language courses, 4 additional language courses and 1 project work. The project work enables the students to approach socio economic issues in theoretical perspective. This program enables the students to contribute to economic policy making researches and socio economic and environmental endeavours in our society.

Department of Malayalam

Department of Malayalam offers BA programme in Malayalam with 13 core courses, 8 complementary courses, 4 additional language courses, 5 language courses, 2 foundation courses, 2 open courses and 1 project work. The programme opens career opportunities in teaching research and journalism.

Department of Physics with computer applications

The Department offers BSc programme with double main –Physics and Computer applications so that the students can pursue higher studies in both the disciplines. The programme includes 12 core courses, 4 complementary courses, 12 vocational courses, 2 additional language courses, 4 language courses, 2 foundation courses, 1 elective course and 1 project work. The unique thing about the course is as it combines both computer application and physics it enables the students to develop software which can be of huge help for Physics research and development. This interdisciplinary course is highly flexible and opens career opportunities in software engineering, research and teaching in both Physics and computer science.

• Choice Based Credit and Semester System and range of subject options
The degree programmes have six types of courses like core courses, complementary
courses, elective courses, open courses, courses in additional language and language
courses. The system allows greater freedom than the conventional system to the
students in the selection of courses. Open courses assure interdisciplinary approach,
and allow them greater freedom to choose from the courses offered by different
departments including minor departments. The electives offer internal mobility
among select core courses.

The institution ensures Academic excellence, personality development and social orientation for the integral transformation of students. The objectives of the curricula offered by the University of Kerala, compliments with the goals of the institution. The range and scope of the courses in each programme assure that the students achieved academic excellence in the respective discipline. Seminar Presentations, Project works, and data collection are imperative for the successful

fulfilment of the programmes and they help the students to develop their personality and outlook. Apart from Academic framework, each programme provides exposure to the students to interact with society, industry and institution through dialogue, seminars, workshop and field studies which ensure their social interaction.

Women's Day is celebrated in the college regularly under the auspicious of Women's Club and discussions are initiated in the campus about discrimination of women and their rights and privileges assuring equal opportunity in all activities.

Climate Change:

The College conducted awareness programmes on global warming, De forestation and planted trees in the campus to sensitize students about environmental issues

ICT:

Almost all the classrooms and the seminar hall are equipped with interactive boards, and all the IT related infrastructure of our college equips our students to face the world with confidence. They also ensure active student participation in the teaching learning process

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The institution regularly collects feedback from students and other stakeholders and these feedbacks are instrumental in the revision of curriculum and college level planning. All the departments in the college have succeeded in getting the curriculum revised as per the feedback provided. The Departments of English, Commerce and Physics had requested the deletion of a few items due to repetition and lack of suitability.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The institution conducts a number of enrichment programmes like seminars, workshops, invited talks, symposiums, debates, discussions and quizzes. Extracurricular activities like club activities, little magazines, manuscript magazines are also done. After such activities, result analysis, collection of feedback and periodic reviewing are conducted to understand the impact and influence of the programmes. Programmes with good rating are promoted and those with poor rating are demoted. They enhance the analytical, critical thinking, and problem solving skills of students besides improving their study habits, time management, and interpersonal skills. The programmes establish a supportive network of peers, staff and faculty. Higher education enrolment ratio is another indicator of the quality of our enrichment programmes.

The institution regularly collects feedback in prescribed format, from students and other 'stake holders' to evaluate the course and the faculty and takes steps to systematically document it. Concerned departments and the college council analyse the feedback and identifies the corrective measures such as modernization of syllabus and other aspects of pedagogy. The representatives of the institution present the views to the bodies responsible for designing of syllabus and evaluation. Many of our faculty are members of Board of Studies, Board of Examinations, and other academic bodies and they influence and incorporate suggestions while designing curriculum.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes, the institution has a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stake holders on curriculum. The students express their views on course and faculty through student evaluation forms. Alumni and parents also register their views during alumni and PTA meetings on curriculum enrichment. The faculty members who are members of Board of Studies, board of examinations obtain regular feedback from academic peers and suggests views on curriculum revision. The institution collects and documents these responses, analyse it and represents them in the concerned bodies of the University.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

Being a Government college, new courses have to be sanctioned and approved by the university and the Government. The college received sanction for the two UG courses B Sc Maths and BA Malayalam during the academic year 2011-12. Proposals for new programmes like M A Economics, B A English, B A Politics are submitted to Government in the current academic year (2013-14).

Nedumangad is an educationally backward Taluk in Thiruvananthapuram district and most of the students of this college are hailing from lower middle class, SC/ST/OBC, minority and other marginalized sessions of the societyand most of them are the first generation degree holders of their family. It is important to ensure opportunities for higher education and employment for these sections of the society to ensure inclusiveness, upward mobility and social justice. The college makes proposals for courses based on demand, employment opportunities and the latest requirement of the society.



CRITERION II

TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

Student Enrolment and Profile 2.1

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The institution follows the policy of the Government of Kerala and the regulations of University of Kerala for the admission of students to various programmes. The affiliating university invites applications for admission to the various programmes offered by the colleges through newspaper calls and University website. The institution gives wide publicity to the admission process through notification in regional news papers, institutional website, University website, college prospectus and notice boards.

The provisional rank lists are exhibited on the notice boards of the college, and the students are informed of the date of admission and other required information through interview cards which are sent sufficiently early to reach the students. Students are also contacted over phone if required. Complaints if any regarding the ranks assigned are considered and changes are effected if required. The process of admission is fully computerized.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

The institution offers six Under Graduate (UG) programmes and two Post Graduate (PG) programme (MA History and M.Com). A single window system is in operation for admission to the postgraduate programmes offered by the institutions under the affiliating University where the applicants make a single application specifying the choice of preference of colleges and allotments are made accordingly. The academic year 2012-13 onwards this system of admission is introduced in the Under Graduate level also.

At the time of admission the provisionally selected candidates and their parents are assembled in a hall where the candidate interviewed by a body consisting of the Principal, Head of the department concerned, class tutor and the admission coordinator. Admission is based on academic merit in the previous qualifying examination. Index mark is the basis for admission which includes the weightage given for NSS/NCC/Literacy activity, achievements in national or state level. The admission procedure is as per the university schedule. Applications for admissions to undergraduate programmes are called for in the month of May. After scrutinizing applications, provisional rank lists of students are published.

Only the applications of students who have secured EHS (Eligibility for Higher Studies) in the qualifying examination are considered. The seats available for admission are set by the state Government and Kerala University. Admission committee members conduct counselling and help the students in the admission process.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The admission is based on the index marks secured by a student, and not exclusively on the percentage of marks obtained in the qualifying examination.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The institution assures that all admissions done are as per the norms and regulations of the University of Kerala and the State Government. Students are admitted to each programme after careful scrutiny of their credentials and qualifications, and the admission process is undertaken by the Admission Committee, which meticulously reviews the process. The profiles of students undergoing each programme are collected at the beginning of every academic year and their skills and interests are identified by the faculty members, and especially the tutors. The students are subsequently motivated to excel in the respective areas and an assessment is done at the end of each academic year to review their achievements and growth.

The institution upholds the spirit of the constitution of India. The genuine concern for equity can be seen in the admission process of the college

1. SC/ST

Students from SC/ST category are allotted seats as per the reservation policy of the Government of Kerala and the guidelines of the university of Kerala. Fees exemption/concession and scholarship benefits are also extended to the students according to rules and regulations of the Government of Kerala.

2. **OBC**

Students from OBC category are allotted seats as per the reservation system followed in the Government of Kerala. Fees exemption/concession and scholarship benefits are also extended to the students according to rules and regulations of the State Government.

3. Women:

75% of the admitted students in this college are girls and there is no separate reservation for women as per Government rules.

4. Physically Handicapped:

One seat is reserved for the Physically Handicapped students in each programme as per the rules of the Government of Kerala.

5. Economically-weaker sections:

Forward Caste BPL (Below Poverty Line) students are given a reservation of 10 % during admissions. They are also eligible for fee concession.

6. Minority Community:

Seven percent seats are reserved for Muslim community in each programme. Two percent seats are also reserved for LC/SIUC and OBC Christians.

7. Sports Reservation:

One seat is reserved for students who have achievements in sports in each programme as per the rules of the Government of Kerala and Kerala University. Apart from this, the students who have excelled in the field of sports are given consideration for admissions. The selection of students for admission is based on their performance in sports and their eligibility for higher studies.

8. Reservation for Lakshadweep Students:

One seat is reserved for Lakshadweep students for each programme as per the rules of Government of Kerala and Kerala University.

RESERVATION CHART IN PERCENTAGE






CHART SHOWING PERCENTAGE OF BOYS AND GIRLS ADMITTED IN THE LAST FIVE YEARS.


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






5. DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICS WITH COMPUTER APPLICATION (PCA)





- ❖ The demand for admission is very high in comparison with the demand in most of other institutions affiliated to the university. Therefore the college strives to start more PG and UG programmes in the campus, and proposals are forwarded to the university and Government of Kerala every year.
- ❖ The requirement of Malayalam professionals in the field of IT, media, teaching and other related fields in Kerala has been reflected in the increased number of applicants for **B.A. Malayalam**. The increase in the demand ratio also indicates the impact of the declaration of Malayalam as the **Classical Language** by the Central Government.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to Government policies in this regard?

Reservation as per the policy of the State Government is followed in the Admission of differently – abled. The number of such applicants is relatively less. Though very few are admitted, the institution pays special attention to their needs. In this effort, Audio CDs are available in the library for the visually challenged. Government stipends are also made available to the differently- abled. Further, the institution offers the provision for scribes in written examinations.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes. The profiles of the students are collected and small tests are conducted at the beginning of every academic programme and their skills and drawbacks are assessed. Students are subjected to various methods of evaluations like vocal responses, individual responses and written tests. Based on their performance, students are identified as slow, average and advanced learners. Students are tested for their previous knowledge by asking probing questions before a teacher engages a particular topic and if found lacking, is taught the basics to bridge the gap.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.

Bridge Courses

A bridge course is conducted at the beginning of every academic year to equip the students to face the programme and the courses with confidence. And also bridge courses are conducted for a week at the class level to get the students acquainted with the programmes. Scholar Support Programme (SSP) conducted with the assistance of the Department of Collegiate Education identifies weak students and their needs and strives to cater to those requirements in a systematic way. The UGC funded remedial teaching classes also have been useful in improving the knowledge level of the students. Peer study groups also help to bridge the knowledge divide among our students.

Orientation programme for freshers

The college conducts a bridge course for the new entrants to give an orientation on the Programme details, Evaluation system, Campus rules and regulations, Library and other infrastructural facilities, co-curricular and extracurricular activities like Sports, NSS and student support services like Anti ragging cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Career guidance Cell etc. Besides this, awareness classes on Cyber crime and legal literacy are also offered to keep them abreast of potential threats and solutions.

Remedial Courses

Remedial coaching aims to provide additional academic support to students belonging to SC,ST,OBC(Non –Creamy layer) and minority communities .classes were organized before or after regular college hours .Typed academic materials were given to students as additional source of information . Classes were handled by teachers belonging to respective departments. An examination was conducted at the end of the coaching program to evaluate the students.

Remedial classes engaged during tutorial hours (beyond the regular hours) bridge the knowledge gap and pay attention to the slow as well as advanced learners besides the Remedial Coaching Classes provided under the UGC funded programme.

Remedial classes conducted after every internal evaluation also helps the slow learners.

Add-on Courses

- The **Department of Commerce** has been handling the UGC funded Career oriented Add-on Course in **Diploma in Tourism Marketing and E-Ticketing**. All first year under graduate students of our college are eligible to undergo the course. The course aims at creating awareness among students about tourism and related activities. The programme was introduced in the department in February 2012. The course is for duration of 5 years and consists of 3 stages: Certificate course ,Diploma course and PG Diploma course. 42 students were admitted in the first batch and 31 students got admission in the second batch.
- The UGC has sanctioned fund for the Career oriented Add- on Course on Information Technology Professional proposed by the Department of Computer Science. All first year under graduate students of our college are eligible to undergo the course. Already 25 students registered for the course. The maximum intake is 30-40 students. This certificate program covers topics word processing, power point, flash, Photoshop and ethics in computing. The classes are arranged 9 am to 10 am and 3.30pm to 4.30 pm on all working days and some Saturdays. Students has to acquire 20 credits for the completion of the course with 12 credits for theory and 8 credits for practical.

Enrichment Programmes

Class seminars help the weak as well as the advanced learners to improve their performance. The activities organized by all the departments contribute to the overall development of the students. Expert lectures, Workshops and Seminars organized at regional, state and national level help the students update their knowledge in different discipline. Students are also encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences and workshops organized by other institutions and universities.

As majority of our students are from the rural background, special attention is paid in organizing programmes on personality development and computer skill enhancement. Legal literacy classes and cyber-crime awareness are also conducted to sensitise them on related issues.

The institution takes interest to expose the advanced learners to the educational and career advancements possible beyond the institution besides the *Walk With A Scholar* Programme. This is achieved through programmes like grooming for civil services, educational tours and visits to industries, manufacturing units etc.

Walk With a Scholar Programme

Walk With a Scholar (WWS) scheme is implemented in our college to arrange specialized mentoring programs for selected students in Under Graduate Programs in Arts, Science and Commerce and to provide guidance for their future. The scheme introduces the idea of mentoring and builds on the concept of mentor as a 'Guide' and 'Friend'. It has been observed that the students in Arts, Science and Commerce Colleges do not get necessary orientation to prepare them for employment or guidance necessary to select areas for higher study. The mentoring scheme for students will be purely voluntary in nature. It will be open for all students entering the first year of the Under Graduate Programme of Study.

The Scheme aims at giving necessary orientation to needy students, to prepare them for employment and give them necessary guidance, motivation and necessary mental support to identify appropriate areas for higher study as well as employment. The mentoring scheme should be planned to identify the opportunities available for the scholars, the areas suitable for them, the manner in which the scholar should proceed before them and evolve ways by which they can be acquired.

Additional Skill Acquisition Program (ASAP)

As the name implies, ASAP program envisages in imparting skills for easy employment of graduate students. The college has started the program from 27.02.2013 onwards. Classes are conducted in every working day morning 9am to 10 am, some Saturdays and during vacations. Now 30 students are getting benefit of it. The first year module consists of 180 hrs training out of which 120 hrs is for communicative English and 60 hrs is for information technology. We have already covered 155 hrs of training. The second phase is for skill training such as Printing

technology, share trading etc. So far 18 students got selection to various skill training course

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.

This institution has a well functioning Student Counselling Centre with professional counsellors for providing counselling service to both the staff and students. Feedback from the counsellors is useful in identifying the problems faced by students and in ameliorating them. Anti-ragging Cell, Anti-sexual harassment Cell, , SC/ST and Minority Cell, NSS undertake programmes to sensitize students on issues of gender, inclusion, human rights, legal literacy, environment and other relevant issues. The college also joins hands with the Social Forestry Wing of the Forest Department of the Government of Kerala to keep the campus green, clean and plastic free.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Adoption of interactive teaching methods help for the better understanding of students by the faculty. ICT enabled teaching helps both the slow and advanced learners. Advanced learners are identified by class tutors and individual teachers from their in-class responses and periodic evaluation tests. Performance in practical classes are also a means to identify them.

The college offers Inflibnet facility supported by high speed Wi-Fi Internet connectivity and EDUSAT facility which provide sufficient exposure to our advanced learners. We have a well furnished general library which also provides digital texts and journals.

The advanced learners are given tasks requiring high order thinking like assigning brainstorming inquisitive topics for seminar presentation. They are also encouraged in creative writing, addressing peers on relevant topics in each subject and given role of student coordinator and leaders. Such students are encouraged to participate in competitions like quiz, debates, elocution, versification etc. at various levels and facilitated through resources like IT, coaching classes for competitive

examinations etc. Motivation through scholarship is also practiced. A friendly environment is created to improve the communication skills of the advanced learners. A number of motivational lectures are organised to channelize their potential to accomplish greater goals.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

Scholar Support Programme is implemented in the college to support the slow learners with the assistance of the Government of Kerala besides the Remedial Coaching Classes provided under the UGC funded programme. The morale of the slow learners is boosted by counselling sessions, remedial classes and intensive interactive sessions before and after the regular class hours. Bridge courses are conducted for a week at the class level to get the students acquainted with the programmes. They are also given guidance and are motivated by providing additional learning material such as text books, audio and video material and question papers of previous examinations.

Each class has a class tutor to maintain a record of personal data, attendance and academic performance of every student. The attendance, behaviour and overall performance are monitored by the tutor as well as the subject teachers engaging them. Special counselling is given to students who are likely to drop out and are thus retained to complete the programmes. Economically weak ones are supported with scholarships like Post Matric Scholarship, Central Sector Scholarship, State Merit Scholarship, District Merit Scholarship, Merit scholarship to Children of School Teachers, Hindi Scholarship, Muslim Nadar Girls Merit Scholarship, Sanskrit Scholarship, Suvarna jubilee Merit Scholarship, and C.H. Muhammed Koya Scholarship. Financial support from department faculty members, are extended to deserving students. PTA also provides financial aid for the economically weak students.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The academic programmes of the college are based on the academic calendar of Kerala University. The departments conduct unit tests, assignments, student projects, industrial visits, student seminars, field trips and other activities depending on the syllabi of the programmes. At the beginning of each semester, a semester plan of teaching is prepared by individual teachers and a copy of the same is forwarded to the IQAC by the Head of Department concerned. Periodic review in department council helps to know the progress and identify the difficulties and take appropriate measures to ensure the committed coverage of the syllabi.

Each faculty member has a Teacher's Diary to record the daily progress of the plan and also the hurdles, if any. Corrective measures are adopted by the respective teachers. Alternative measures include engaging extra hours by internal swaps and extra classes on holidays. Special time tables are issued towards the end of the semester to facilitate effective time and resource management.

Planning and preparation is done for laboratory works. Charts and procedures for all the experiments are prepared and made available to students. The departments also carry out internal assessment based on students' performance in class tests, assignments, seminar presentations, and attendance. Hourly attendance is taken which is reviewed weekly and consolidated semester-wise. The final evaluation of students is done according to the university schedule. Towards the end of each semester, the internal grades are published on the notice board and complaints received if any are rectified and forwarded to the university. Theory and practical examinations are conducted by the university and evaluation is carried out. The results of examinations are declared and score cards issued by the university.

Evaluation blue print is communicated at the beginning of the semester by respective subject teachers and assessments are carried out as per the scheme of evaluation followed by the affiliating university.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

IQAC has been instrumental in promoting quality enhancement and sustenance through self-appraisal, evaluation and feed backs. Feed backs from various sources play a crucial role in assessing the teaching and learning process. These are obtained through Student feedback forms; Suggestion boxes placed at the most accessible spots, Personal feedbacks, communication from students and to some extent from peer assessment.

Improvement of the infrastructure for effective teaching - learning is also a prime concern of IQAC. There has been a remarkable progress in this area during the last few years. 03 Smart board, 09 LCDs, 68 Desktops, 15 Laptops, 01 OHP, 1 Slideprojector,02Plasma TV, 1 VCP, Audio/video CDs, Teaching models and charts add to the list of equipment. As part of improving the facilities a Language Lab, IT lab, Seminar hall, Conference hall (Edusat Hall) and IT supported spacious library has been constructed. In addition to the Network Resource Centre in the library and IT lab, Broad band / Wi-Fi connectivity is extended to all the departments, office, computer lab and Library. Inflibnet access is available to all staff and students.

IQAC promotes quality enhancement, to keep abreast with the latest innovations and concepts in teaching and learning. Seminars and workshops are organized periodically to get exposed to the recent trends. Faculty members have the provision for availing FDP under UGC for undertaking research degree. A total of five faculty members have availed this facility in the last plan period. Teachers are given opportunity to attend seminars, workshops and conferences organized by universities, organizations and other institutions. Participation of faculty in orientation and refresher courses conducted by academic staff colleges of different universities is also promoted. As a reflection of the social as well as academic commitment, faculty members are encouraged to undertake Research projects and publish their findings as research papers and articles. Above all, teachers are motivated to be resource persons within and outside the institution. Opportunity for interaction with external experts is also utilized whenever possible.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

During the last few years we are gradually shifting the learning process from teacher-centered-pedagogy to student-centered-pedagogy with the active participation of students in project works, field trips, seminars and discussions. Now the institution ensures student centric environment by means of interactive method rather than lecture method. The assignments and projects are given both individually and collectively which contribute to their collaborative learning potential. Presentations by the students open up opportunity for interacting with the teachers as well as among themselves. Feedback on respective seminar presentations, assignments and projects offer a platform for participatory evaluation.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Practical classes, Student projects, Field trips, Industrial visits, Environment awareness programmes and other various academic and co-academic programmers conducted in this college nurture critical thinking, scientific temper, communication skill, analytical ability, emotional quotient, decision making skill, and creative thinking among the students. The institution provides Wi-Fi internet accessibility, EDUSAT facility and INFLIBNET facility to all students to gather up-to-date information and to cope with the modern technology.

Creative writing skill is improved through department magazines, manuscript magazines and college magazines. Leadership skill and management skill of the students are encouraged through works like campus beautification, documentary and short film making. Participation in NSS, and various clubs like Eco Club, Science Club, Performing Arts Club are also boost their team working skills, self esteem, and individuality. Science subjects offer practical classes which promote learning through experiments, dissections and activities. All the students of VI semester undertake a project in the core course as part of their course work. This in turn helps in analytical and reasoning abilities.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty members for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The institution is equipped with overhead projectors, interactive boards, LCD projectors and the entire faculty members and students have access to Wi-Fi broadband internet. All the departments and library has Wi-Fi broad band internet and Inflibnet facility. All the departments offering core subject are provided with a laptop and LCD projector. The faculty members make use of this facility to update their knowledge, improve teaching using power point presentations and visuals. **Smart board** available in the PG departments and Virtual laboratory is put to optimum use for effective teaching. Every department and lab is furnished with scanners and printers which can be easily accessed by the faculty members.

The faculty members in the institution use both non-projected aids like blackboard/ white board and electronic teaching aids to ensure effective learning experience for students. Through the use of illustrations, interactive boards, simulation software and power point presentations the process of teaching-learning is made more interesting and effective. The setting up of a Language Laboratory and Edusat Centre has helped the students to keep pace with modern technology in the teaching-learning process.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty members exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)

Blended learning

The department of Malayalam has recently started a blog, named *MALAYALA VIBHAGAM*(gcnmalayalam.blogspot.com) to provide an outlet for the creative imagination of the Faculty Members and Students. It serves as an interactive, informal platform to post and comment. Besides forming an informal feedback for improvement, it becomes an instructional resource for students.

The entire campus is enabled with high speed Wi-Fi connectivity which can be accessed freely by the faculty members and students. All the PG classrooms and the Edusat hall are equipped with interactive boards. Language lab settings are utilized for learning language. About 60% of classes are engaged with the help of technology integration. Students of the Commerce Department visit nearby Commercial Institutions to familiarize the practical and industrial applications involved in the syllabi.

Expert lectures, seminars, workshops

The institute encourages participation of both the students and faculty in seminars, workshops and conferences organized by various institutions and organizations. Teachers participate in regional and national/international seminars in their respective fields, and new information gathered from there are disseminated to the student community. National seminars are conducted in each department and students get opportunity to listen to and interact with the subject experts. A few of the best students are also given opportunity to present papers. Experts from industry and academy are invited to deliver talks, and students and faculty members benefit academically from these sessions

2.3.7 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty members during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty members to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Last few years have seen an improvement in teaching using more of visuals, power points and student - centered approaches. The college is well aware of the rapid changes in the field of higher education and research, and the college has been taking efforts to keep pace with the innovative teaching-learning practices. The following are a few of the measures adopted:

- ➤ student centered approaches like seminar presentations, project works, debates, discussions, role taking, quizzes ,dramatization, group discussions, and peer assessment.
- ➤ The faculty members have changed from the use of conventional blackboards to interactive smart boards for teaching.
- ➤ The faculty members effectively utilize the Wi-Fi internet and Inflibnet facility for data collection, preparation of notes and for enhancing the student participation in learning.
- ➤ The students are trained and motivated to make seminar presentations with the help of ICT.
- > Students are encouraged to submit their assignments online so that the use of paper can be reduced.
- > Students are also prompted to use scanners and printers for academic purposes
- Movies and documentaries related to the curriculum are exhibited before the classes so that teaching can be made effective and easier.
- ➤ Hands-on learning is encouraged through field visits, industrial visits and project works.
- > Students are motivated to access digital learning materials and e-books for data collection.
- ➤ The faculty members are given full freedom in adopting their own effective approach in transacting the curriculum.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The College has a spacious library with a good number of books, Journals and periodicals in various disciplines. Recent and authentic books are available in the Reference section of the library. The students can access books, newspapers, journals and magazines from the library, and if required can photocopy the materials. New editions are added regularly and the library stock is updated with current volumes. Students are issued books from the library for the preparation of seminars, assignments and project works. There is also provision for free Internet and Inflibnet facility. Use of the library and the digital resources and books are highly encouraged by all to promote enquiry based and project based learning.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The institution hardly faces any challenge from within, except during times of teacher participation in orientation and refresher programmes. Often challenges appear in the form of *hartals*, bus strikes, *bandh* etc. Loss of working days due to any reason is complemented by additional classes on Saturdays or through extra hours.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Teaching - learning is monitored mainly by the Heads of Departments. The faculty members themselves are encouraged to collect the feedback of students to better the teaching learning practice. The IQAC monitors the committed coverage of portions through the semester plan submitted by individual teachers at the beginning of each semester. The Heads of the Departments assure that all the required teaching and works in connection with internal assessments are done in time. Faculty members are also advised to improve teaching strategies based on the result analysis of the concerned papers. The heads of the departments assure that the teachers maintain work diaries. Periodic evaluation is conducted through class tests. Personal and informal feedback or suggestions from students and parents are also taken into account towards improvement in teaching-learning,

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1. Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

The permanent faculty members of the college are recruited by the Kerala Public Service Commission as per the norms insisted by UGC and the Government of Kerala. FDP substitutes and Guest faculty members are recruited by a Selection Committee consisting of the Principal, Vice Principal and the Head of the Department concerned, by interviewing eligible candidates included in the registry prepared by the Department of Collegiate Education, Government of Kerala. The selection is based on merit, NET/PhD and teaching experience at college level.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teachinglearning process?

The IQAC regularly takes feedback from the students at the end of each semester through specially designed questionnaire, and the data thus received is reviewed by the faculty members concerned and required alterations in teaching strategies and methods are effected in the subsequent semesters. The Head of the institution collects the feedback on teachers from external peers visiting the institution as examiners of practical examinations. Their suggestions are passed to the faculty members for improvement of teaching. The procedure facilitates the teaching learning process.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty members are aware of the evaluation processes?

The evaluation processes followed by the College is mainly based on the pattern implemented by the University of Kerala. Whenever a new pattern is introduced, the College deputes one or two faculty members to attend workshops and similar programmes organised by the university. Training programmes on new methods of evaluation are also organised in the institution by inviting experts in the field. Faculty members are also encouraged to attend centralized valuation camps and all examiners' Board meeting for practical exams arranged by the University in the end of the semester examinations.

The detailed process of evaluation is communicated to the students at the beginning of the programme and course by the concerned subject teacher and class tutor. The same is also displayed on the department notice board. The previous university examination question papers and model papers are made available to the students in the department. The students are informed of class tests and assignments and their scores are displayed on the notice boards of the respective departments. Students are also informed of the schemes of evaluation, updates on curriculum revision, alterations in the question patters and do's and don'ts during practical examinations. Model examinations are conducted before the university semester examinations to prepare students to face the examinations with confidence.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The University of Kerala to which the College is affiliated has introduced the **Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS)** in the UG level w.e.f. 2010 academic year. The University introduced the **Grading System** also as the method of evaluation at the degree level. It is a continuous evaluation process which includes both external and internal assessments. Both CE (Continuous Evaluation) and ESE

(End Semester Evaluation) will be carried out using **Direct Grading System** on a 5-pont scale:

After the successful completion of a Semester SGPA (Semester Grade Point Average) of a student shall be calculated. Cumulative grade point average(CGPA) is calculated by dividing the sum of the credit points in all courses for the entire programme by the total number of credits. An overall letter grade for the whole Programme shall be awarded based on the value of CGPA. using a 7-point scale as CGPA between 3.80 – 4.00 is A+; 3.50 – 3.79 is A; 3.00 – 3.49 is B+; 2.50 – 2.99 is B; 2.00 – 2.49 is C+; 1.50 – 1.99 is C; Less than 1.5 is D. For the successful completion of a Programme and award of the Degree, a student must pass all Courses satisfying the minimum credit requirements and must score a minimum CGPA of 2.00 or an overall grade of C+.

The institution has adopted these reforms and follows the system meticulously. In the internal assessments, weighed grade points are awarded for attendance, class test, assignment, seminar, performance in the laboratory, record work, project work, etc. The process of tabulation of marks is computerized, and displayed on the notice boards of the respective departments. Complaints if any are examined by the Students' Grievance Redressal Cell and recommendations are made to the departments concerned for rectification if required before forwarding it to the university.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

At the start of the academic year, the institution announces tentative dates for the internal class tests and conduct examinations in a centralised mode for each semester. It also ensures the publication of grade points and grades in the stipulated time. It is mandatory that every department has to prepare a question bank on the concerned course and duly submit to the university so as to ensure the effectiveness of the evaluation system.

At the beginning of the semester, each student is allotted a topic as assignment under each course and a tentative date for submission and presentation of seminar is given. Group and individual projects are also assigned in a similar manner specifying the time for submission of report. Proper guidance is also ensured during the project work for the effective and timely completion.

External examinations for all semesters are conducted as per the schedule of the University. Question papers and answer sheets for the same are issued by the University for which the college shall be accountable in terms of confidentiality and the numbers issued. The college has an examination section with Principal as the chief superintendent of examinations, a senior teacher in charge of the papers concerned as additional superintendent, a clerk and supporting staff for the smooth running of the schedule. This wing discharges its function efficiently with the cooperation of all the faculty members.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

As a part of the formative evaluation, internal assessment grade points and grade are given to the students based on presentation of seminar, attendance, project, assignment and written tests (objective and descriptive) as prescribed bythe University. Provision for Retest is allowed for the students under genuine grounds. Conduct of two internal examinations in the centralized manner ensures the uniformity and transparency of the examination system.

Summative evaluation is through examinations conducted at the end of each semester by the University in both theory and practical courses. The announcement of dates for the seminars and assignments at the beginning of each semester helps the students to plan and prepare effectively and there by regularity and punctuality of the students are monitored. Since the topics are given in advance, the students get enough time for preparation, doubt clearance and interaction with faculty and peers, thereby promoting enquiry —based learning is promoted. Project based learning by grouping the students ensure group learning and research skill development. Presentation skills of the students are enhanced by seminar topics in each course where the teacher in charge monitors the communication skill, content, presentation of the topic, use of teaching aids etc. and makes necessary corrections at the end. In such a way Communication and teaching ability of the students are improved in successive semesters.

2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

Grade point and grade obtained in each course is displayed on the concerned Department notice board at the end of every semester. The result is analysed by the individual teachers and students are hence encouraged and helped to improve. Semester wise result analysis is done by concerned class tutor and communicated to parents

2.5.6 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

Internal assessment is conducted by the concerned Department as course-wise. After every test paper, the valued answer scripts are issued to the student for

verification, corrections, if any, are made and the final grade and grade point is displayed on the concerned department notice board. The grade points awarded for all the parameters like assignment, seminar, test paper, performance in Laboratory, record and attendance are displayed one week prior to the finalizing of the internal grades.

Course-wise grade point scored by each student in the internal assessment is uploaded to the university website on time with the supervision of the concerned faculty member handling the course. The heads of the departments hand over Attendance and Progress Certificate of the students to the administrative section in charge of examinations. Only those students who secure 75% of attendance are eligible to appear for university examinations. Evaluators also give due weightage to the communication skills behavioural aspects independent learning, research aptitude, presentation skills, observation and keenness while awarding grade points, especially to seminars, assignments and performance in Laboratory.

2.5.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

The College and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. If a significant number of students do not achieve good performance in the respective topic, the Head of the Department monitors the faculty and give necessary suggestions for improvement.

2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The college has a Student Grievance Redressal Cell which considers complaints of students regarding the internal grades awarded by the departments. The cell is constituted from among the senior teachers and heads of the departments. The internal grades are scrutinized by the cell before forwarding to the University. The University also has formed a Student Grievances Cell which considers matters regarding both

Continuous Evaluation (CE) grades as well as the grades of End Semester Evaluation (ESE) conducted by the university. It offers an opportunity to the students to get their answer scripts re-evaluated within a stipulated time.

2.6 Student performance and Learning Outcomes

Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

The institution aims to orient the young students towards academic excellence, personality development and social commitment. The curriculum and the syllabi of the academic programmes offered in this college are transacted in such a way that these objectives are realized by the successful completion of the programmes. Selfreliance and skills in communication, coordination, planning, management, academic writing, and presentation are to be acquired by the students through these programmes. These learning outcomes are communicated to the student's right from the beginning of the academic programmes during the induction ceremony and orientation sessions.

2.6.2 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The College promotes student centric learning through assignments, projects, seminars, project works and practical sessions, through which the students acquire and develop skill in collecting, processing and presenting relevant data, and also develop skills in communication, co-ordination, planning, management and academic writing. The performance of the teachers is subjected to periodic monitoring by IQAC. Publication of exam calendar at the commencement of each semester helps the students to plan and study the syllabus within the stipulated time. After publishing the first internal examination results, weaker students are identified and provisions for remedial classes during the tutorial hours are made. As part of teaching-learning strategy, the institution provides the students with free internet access, INFLIBNET facility, EDUSAT, and these facilities help the students to collect up-to-date information for learning. The institution encourages field visits, industrial visits and interaction with experts through seminars and workshops, by which the students develop their knowledge, personality and social orientation. Exposure for students to interact with students of other colleges are also arranged to familiarize the innovative practices existing outside the institution and also attending seminars in nearby colleges on topics related to the newly introduced syllabus.

2.6.3. What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

The programmes offered in the College equip the students to undertake quality jobs and materialise their career ambitions. The college provides booklets containing information on recruitment processes, higher education institutions, interview techniques, group discussion strategies and quality jobs. All the eligible students of the institution have registered with Kerala Public Service Commission (one time registration). The college periodically displays PSC/UPSC and other job notifications so that students can apply for them in time.

The Career Guidance Cell and Placement Cell (UGC funded programmes) are functioning in the campus to enhance the career opportunity and skills of the students. Under the Career Guidance Cell, the importance, relevance of career opportunities of each subject is arranged to make the students aware of the current trends of their subject on a global basis. Students are provided with career magazines which enable them to cope with the current trends in the job market.

Walk With a Scholar Programme(WWS)implemented in the College aims at giving necessary orientation to needy students, to prepare them for employment and give them necessary guidance, motivation and necessary mental support to identify appropriate areas for higher study as well as employment. The programme introduces the idea of mentoring. Mentoring is a personal enhancement strategy through which one person facilitates the development of another by sharing known resources, expertise, values, skills, perspectives, attitudes and proficiencies. It allows the learner to build skills and knowledge while attaining goals for career development.

The active participation of students in national seminars is encouraged to develop their research aptitude. Entrepreneurial club under the guidance of the department of Commerce gives entrepreneurial guidance to the students. Alumni members in reputed posts are also invited to interact with the students for sharing their experience motivate and make them aspirant of demanding positions. Opportunity to interact with experts from industries help the students knows the scope and importance of various subjects. Classroom interactions by the concerned teachers on the practical application of the course also help in the understanding of the thrust areas. Industrial visit, study trip, practical in various subjects oriented towards social and economic relevance also enhances their aptitude in the subject. Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP) strengthens the self-confidence and passion about the subject.

2.6.4. How does the institution collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Result of internal exam and university results are used as indicators of the student performance. Peer group formation and discussion make the slow learners to improve their study. The class tutors monitor the slow learners to find out the exact reason of their low performance and give necessary suggestions and motivations. If needed, counsellors are made available to them. The Class tutors keep track of the performance of each student and communicate to the Head of the dept. and give necessary help and motivation to ensure the achievement of desired learning outcome. We offer special coaching to the weak students from each programme under the auspices of Scholar Support Programme (SSP).

Interdisciplinary topics are handled by teachers of respective departments to make students understand the topics effectively and to break the monotony. Interdisciplinary projects are also carried out in VI semester to widen the knowledge and to make them understand about the relevance of the subject in other fields as well. Use of internet, virtual class room and student oriented teaching methods are also carried out to make them more involved.

2.6.5. How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

Continuous evaluation under CBCS is useful in ensuring the achievement of learning outcomes of our students. Grades are given on the basis of the achievement of the required skills and abilities. Besides, the exposure provided to the students through various curricular and co-curricular activities on a regular basis ensure that the learning outcomes are achieved in the course of the programme. The results obtained in the semester examinations, higher education enrolment ratio, feedback from industries all point toward the achievement of the learning outcome of our students.

2.6.6. What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

Our college attempts to build 21st century career skills among the graduate in a number of ways. Self reliance in academic and personal matters is the graduate attribute specified by the college. Various skills like Decision making and leadership are developed through the participation in National Service Scheme, Personality development programmes, Office bearer ship in college union etc. Democratic value is promoted in the Election of office bearers to College union, selection of secretary to National Service Scheme etc.NSS unit renders chances to serve the society, developing a sense of community and commitment which are valued as quality attributes by the institution. Soft skill development is attained through the IT Skill development programmes, and NSS camps.

2.6.7. Any other relevant information regarding Teaching-Learning and Evaluation which the college would like to include.

High speed Wi-Fi internet and INFLIBNET facilities, EDUSAT facility, availability of computers, availability of Digital Language Lab, facility for scanning,

printing and copying, good academic ambience and the regularly updated library are the strengths of our institution. Our faculty members are actively engaged in projects, research and higher studies. UGC assisted programmes, the support and encouragement of PTA and alumni and the availability of scholarships to all the students contribute towards the academic excellence of our institution. Being a college of the rural area dealing with various minorities, the college plays a pivotal role in imparting the desired knowledge and skills by making the best use of the available resources and man power. The institution takes great responsibility to ensure that the students get through the course, assessments and other formalities on time by communicating all the relevant information.

RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

The college does not have a research centre currently. We have started PG in Commerce 1999-2000 under CSS and PG in History in 1998-99, and the college is in the process of establishing research centre in frontier areas of arts, commerce & science.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

Yes, The college has constituted a Research Committee to facilitate research activity and also to monitor and address the issues of research activities consisting of the Principal, senior faculty members having and pursuing their research towards Ph D.

The College performs the following activities:

- The committee creates research awareness among the faculty and students by arranging lectures.
- The circulars of UGC and other funding agencies related to research are brought to the notice of all the faculty of the college.
- The guidance regarding preparation of research proposals and various funding agencies is given to the faculty.
- Boost research activities among the faculty, to submit more number of major and minor research proposals to various funding agencies.
- Sanction duty leave to the faculty for attending seminars, workshops and conferences.

- Encourage the faculty to register themselves for M Phil. and Ph D programmes
- Encourage the faculty to publish papers, research articles in reputed journals and books with ISSN, ISBN and newspapers.
- Encourages its staffs for conducting National Seminars, International Seminars, Workshops and as a result major departments have come out with many seminars in the past academic years.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

The college has taken various steps to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of the research schemes or projects funded by UGC, Government of India.

The college offers independence to the faculties involved in research projects. It ensures timely availability of resources, and provides adequate facility with regard to work environment, basic infrastructures, computer facilities, internet, support of the other staff of the college. Adequate budgetary provision for library is made to procure books, journals and C Ds etc. required for research work.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

As a part of academic syllabus, the research aptitude among students by conducting seminars/symposia and project works has improved. They are taught research methodology and sufficient advices are given to them for the report writing of their projects. We conduct visits to leading research institutions in Kerala like KELTRON to introduce various opportunities for the students to take research as a career. The students of B.A./B.Com are assigned small research projects in Environmental Studies where they are required to collect data by actually visiting the sites to draw valid inferences.

All these efforts have developed scientific aptitude among students. Many of our students have been actively involved in research in the previous years.

The college has a Language Lab, a computer lab, a UGC Network Resource Centre equipped with desk top computers, uninterrupted power supply and necessary softwares. High-speed Wi-Fi broadband internet connectivity, INFLIBNET facility, EDUSAT facility, journals, magazines, printing, copying and scanning facilities and an annually updated general library are available to students and researchers. The students utilize these facilities for carrying out their academic projects.

The college encourages faculty members to apply for financial assistance from the UGC, government departments and other funding agencies in the form of major and minor research projects. The college have submitted proposals to upgrade the existing lab facilities and it has already set up a research room with necessary infrastructure to motivate research works and projects.

The institution offers full support to the faculty members to utilize their expertise for consultancy service outside the college. As the college is not encouraging any consultancy inside, the facilities are not utilised.

As our college is in rural area consultancy services are confined to skill development classes, computer awareness classes, seminars etc. Consultancy services are free of cost and the main aim is to bring the students to the forefront so that they are able to meet the current market challenges.

Our college does not intend to get remuneration for consultancy services. It is basically aimed to help the society, by utilising the resources available in the college.

The college is situated in a rural area. Most of the people lack proper education and related facilities. They are not aware of the recent trends and changes taking place in the society. The institution organizes programmes to eliminate their problems by the active involvement of NSS units of the college. The students of our college actively participate in these programmes and help them. These activities help the students to practice good citizenship and give them service orientation.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

As the college is rurally backward, the students utilise the best use of their social skills by being actively engaged in social activities. The college extends all possible support to the students to involve in social movements that promote citizenship roles. The NSS units of the college work with a focus on promoting citizenship roles in students. The staff advisor and the coordinators of the respective units track the involvement of the students. The attendance of the students in these activities is registered without any fail and grace marks are provided at the final stage of their graduation. The students are also encouraged to participate in National Integration Camps of NSS. The college union election is conducted in a democratic manner and it helps to enhances students' political consciousness and social participation.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The quality and performance of the college is reflected through the feedback received from alumni, PTA, MLA's councilors, Educational experts, internal exams, seminars, assignments, test papers, semester exams and different programmes undertaken by the college. It provides adequate materials for the assessment.

Outreach programmes of the college are planned and organised by the different clubs operating in the college. Some of the programmes conducted are Blood donation campaigns, Distributing Food packets to Taluk hospitals once in a week, Conducting Health Awareness Programmes, Waste management, Envoronment protection programmess, Road safety awareness programmes, Conducting classes on Tourism and its impact etc. These activities make our students more oriented towards society and it helps in developing their personality and responsible citizenship.

3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/International agencies?

The college has an active participation of NSS volunteers in its overall development. The two units of NSS volunteers have around 200 students. The college celebrates all the important dates and events with a very active participation from all the staffs.

The college encourages the faculty and students to participate in extension activities. The faculty members are awarded with grade points for the service they render, which is beneficial for the performance based appraisal for their career based on the 6^{th} pay commission guidelines. The students successfully completing the service are awarded with grace marks at the end of their course. This mark is beneficial for admission to higher studies and for job placements.

The college has adopted a village in the Nedumangad Taluk for the NSS activity. The college identifies needy students and various kinds of scholarships like merit scholarships, minority scholarships, PH/Blind scholarships are provided to encourage them come to the forefront. Students are advised to contribute funds if they can. It helps the needy students and thus provide a way to promotes social justice and concern for the people from the lower strata of the society.

The blood donation campaigns help the students in understanding the need and importance of timely availability of blood in case of emergencies. The road safety campaigns conducted an awareness of safety driving in the context of increasing road accidents. The organ donation campaigns stress the need to help other people who are less privileged and have difficulty in saving a dear and near one in emergency situations.

Meetings with local self governments and other associations help in knowing about various community related topics that must be looked into by the college. The institution maintains good rapport with political and social activists and organizations, and assures their involvement in the programmes undertaken by the college. The Women's Studies Cells have conducted various programmes related to Health problems of Girl students, Legal rights of Women, Guidance and Counselling classes by experts in their fields.

What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure 4.1.1 that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

Research and experience have shown that the use of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) enhances the teaching and learning process and contribute to skill formation. The infrastructure of the institution is continuously enhanced with this view.

We have installed

- 1. White boards in all class rooms and smart boards in three smart class rooms.
- 2. EDUSAT facility
- 3. High speed Wi-Fi internet facility
- 4. Centralized Computing Facility
- 5. Digital Language Lab for developing communication skills
- 6. Physics and Computer lab with advanced instruments
- 7. UGC Network Resource Centre
- 8. General library with internet connectivity.

Detail the facilities available for 4.1.2

Curricular and co-curricular activities - classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.

The institution has 29 spacious, well ventilated class rooms (3 Smart class rooms) with black boards, white boards, LCD projector, podiums and adequate seating facility for learners. There are 3 well equipped laboratories namely Digital Language Lab, Centralized Computer Lab (33 computers, one laser printer), and Physics Lab. Most of the departments available Wi-Fi facility. There are 10 staff rooms in total. The institute has computers with the latest configuration in a student ratio of 1:7 and UPS power back up. We have five multi functioning photo copiers. All the departments have been provided with computers, laptops, LCD projectors, laser printers, scanners, 10 Mbps internet connectivity, collar microphone with amplifier and speaker.

EDUSAT facility has been set up in the college which facilitates live streaming of classes by experts. It has a seating capacity of 60, Air conditioned room with modern amenities such as LCD projector, interactive board, LCD TV ,digital camera, microphones ,etc acts as the seminar hall as well as board room. The PG department of History is having in the process of launching a well organized historical museum in consultation with the archaeological department. An amount of Rs 4 lakhs has been sanctioned for this purpose. The institution has a well furnished and semi-automated library with 19,193 books. The library is computerized with adequate space for internet browsing, photo copying and reference for students and faculty. All the staff and students have access to internet . Besides, most of the departments have departmental library for providing current journals and Periodicals.





ICT enabled classes can thus enhance the teaching-learning process. Using ICT students can initiate their own inquiry, develop hypotheses, and then test them. They provide opportunities for students to practice basic skills on their own time and at their own pace. They provide access to worldwide information resources and offer the most cost-effective means for bringing the world into the

classroom. This way the student is placed at the center of teaching-learning process and the teacher assumes the role of a facilitator.

Govt. College, Nedumangad hosts an Entrepreneurship Development Club under the guidance of the Department of Commerce which promotes entrepreneurial skills among the students. Students are given opportunity to develop skills related to different careers and self employments such as photography, videography, visual documentation, scripting & editing and event management.

NSS volunteers plan to cultivate paddy in alliance with model farmers in the neighborhood, so that students shall be made aware of the nuances of farming and agricultural cultivation.

The institution promotes the active participation of the students in various cocurricular activities. The activities of various clubs and cells enrich the participation of students in extra and co-curricular activities.

Department of Physical Education is a centre for molding intellectually enriched, emotionally balanced and physically strong young men and women. Department has its own infrastructure such as playground with volley ball court, power lifting sets, fitness centre, gymnasium, wrestling mats etc. By utilizing these facilities students ensure participation at district, university and state level competitions. The college hosts an active sports club. Sports materials are supplied to the students to develop their performance in different sports events. We have been regularly upgrading our sports equipments using the funds elicited from both the UGC and the Department of Collegiate Education.

A well organized arts club is functioning in the college that enriches creativity among the students. Various cultural activities such as Fine arts Festival and College day celebrations and programmes under different departmental associations organized by the democratically elected college union ignite the talents among the students.

Quiz competitions are conducted by the departments concerned, NSS unit and other outside organizations as well at regular intervals. The academic seminars and workshops also offer a platform for debates and discussions. In association with different outside agencies and organizations, debates and open forums are conducted by the departments and NSS unit. These programmes facilitate students to express their views and ideas

It deserves special mention that many students who completed their graduation and post graduation from our college have qualified NET, SET and other competitive examinations such as Bank Test (P.O/Clerk), Departmental Tests, Public Service CommissionTests etc.

Personal and academic counseling are rendered by the concerned class tutor. And a counseling cell also functions and it aims to provide psychological counseling to the students who are suffering from mental stress and other problems.

Walk With a Scholar Programme (WWS) implemented in this College aims at giving necessary orientation to needy students, to prepare them for employment and give them necessary guidance, motivation and necessary mental support to identify appropriate areas for higher study as well as employment.

Our College has a career Guidance and Placement Cell (UGC funded) with a co-ordinator and two faculty as members. The Cellfunctions the centre for identifying job opportunities in different sectors. The Cell organises various guidance and motivation sessions and maintains a notice board for display of news paper calls of job opportunities and training programmes. It maintains a well organized databank of the students. Arrangescareer oriented lectures and talks by specialists, collects all the information onvarious opportunities to assist students to build up their career.

The Career guidance and counseling cell offers academic and personal counselingand also helps students by providing an external counselor to solve complicatedissues and problems. It conducts mock interviews and model tests toprepare the students to build up a better career. Due to the remoteness of the institution very few employers are attracted for campus interviews. The cell provides the following services to the students:

- Students are sent for training programmes and camps.
- Campus recruitment drives are conducted

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years

The college has a Student's Grievance Redressal Cell for the past many years. The cell includes the principal, Vice-Principal, PTA secretary, selected staff members and student representatives. The Staff Council also plays an important role in enforcing discipline as well as redressing student grievances.

The Cell functions in a decentralized manner. Students are free to submit their complaints, if any, to the Grievances Reddressal Cell in the department, consisting of Heads of Departments and senior faculty members and Class tutors. If their complaints are not dealt with satisfactorily in the Cell, they can appeal to the college level committee. Further justice, if needed, can be had from the University level committee. Since the introduction of the Continuous Assessment method, student complaints, hearing and redressing have become formalized.

Some grievances redressed during the last four years are:

- As requested and suggested by the students it was decided to open the College library and Reading room from 8.30 a.m. onwards on all working days.
- As pointed out by the students, the number of fans in the class room has been increased and water coolers were installed in all blocks.
- The minor political confrontations of the students' organizations are effectively redressed.
- As requested by the students the College provides the facility for parking two wheelers.
- As a solution to the water scarcity in the college, two extra tanks were setup to ensure steady supply of water.
- Following complaints on the quality of food in the canteen, the College take necessary action to provide quality food ataffordable price.

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

An Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell functions in the collegeheaded by the Principal for handling issues on sexual harassment. The committee conducts preliminary investigations and submit the report to the Principal. Based on the reportPrincipal and College council will take necessary actions as per University, Stategovernment and UGC rules. However no such incidents have been reported in the college so far.

The college has an Anti-Ragging Cell with the principal as the head and Vice-Principal, selected staff members, the Sub Inspector of Police and senior students as members. The committee conducts separate awareness class on anti-ragging to both the freshers and the senior students at the beginning of every academic year, just before the commencement of classes. The committee constitute a squad to be vigilant in tracking such matters. The details of the cell are displayed on the notice board. With these precautionary measures, no incidents have been reported so far

The College, being a public institution has several student welfare schemes. Our College is offering study materials, Books etc. free of cost to financially backward students. There is a college canteen that provides food at subsidized rates for students. The Women's Study Unit has organized functions aimed at the welfare of girl students. A Co-Operative Store is working in the college to meet the necessities of students at discounted rates such as photocopying, stationery items, text books etc.

The National Service Scheme units of the College organizes programmes aimed at development of student personality through annual camps, special classes conducted on an annual basis and training programme. Students of the college are sent to various outside- the- campus competitions such as quizzes, debates and the like.

Our institution motivate the students to continue the course by highlighting the importance of doing Degree programs and its employment possibilities. Providing extra classes for the low performers and also to the students those who couldn't attend the regular classes. Arranging motivation and counseling classes. Students-dropout has been reduced by identifying weaker students with the help of PTA meetings regularly conducted for the U.G classes. Class PTA meetings organized at the department level address issues such as student absenteeism and underperformance. The students are also assisted to avail the various State and central governments scholarships. It offer the students a motivation to excel in their studies. As a result the dropout rate in the institution is very low.

5.2.9. How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

Carrier Guidance and Placement Cell (UGC funded) is functioning in the college acts as a centre for identifying job opportunities and higher education facilities. Students are informed of the higher education institutions and application procedures. Notification of admission to premier institutions is displayed on the notice board and students are encouraged to apply for admission. As a result, our students have began to apply for admission at premier institutions such as Kerala University, MG University, Calicut University, and central Universities, and we have succeeded in getting them admission in these centers.

Additional Skill Acquisition Program(ASAP) implemented in our Collegeenvisages in imparting skills for easy employment of graduate students. Classes are conducted in every working day morning 9am to 10 am, some Saturdays and during vacations. Now 30 students are getting benefit of it. The first year module consists of 180 hrs training out of which 120 hrs is for communicative English and 60 hrs is for information technology. We have already covered 155 hrs of training. The second phase is for skill training such as Printing technology, share trading etc. So far 18 students got selection to various skill training courses. Scheme like 'Walk with a Scholar Programme' also facilitate student progression to higher level of education and towards employment.

5.2.10. Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

Remedial Coaching Classes for SC/ST/OBC and Minorities (UGC Funded) have been instrumental in considerably reducing the dropout rate of our students and in raising their academic performance. Besides, the newly introduced scheme 'Scholar Support Programme' is being implemented in the college with the funding of the Government of Kerala. Under this scheme, 10 students who are weak in their respective subjects are identified and provided with special coaching. Each department conducts remedial coaching for weaker students and special counseling classes are given to avoid the problem of drop outs.

N.S.S unit of Govt College Nedumangad and PTA organized special ceremonies and also gave many special awards to Sarika.K.H for her glorious achievement during this period.

Special Camp Programme

During December vacation a Seven Day special Camp "Healthy Youth for Healthy India" was conducted in Govt Girls Higher Secondary School Nedumangadu from 21-12-2012 to27-12-2012. Our 105 N.S.S volunteers were actively participated in the Camp. The Camp was inaugurated by Sri. Palode Ravi MLA. Highlights of the special camping programme were "Clean City Programme, Waste Management and construction of pipe Composite Project". N.S.S volunteers cleaned the wastages and also constructed various devices for eliminating wastages in campus and society around the college. Our unit also organized various workshops, Seminars, Debates and Classes in various topics. In the camp Dr. Anil Kumar, superintendent, Thaluk hospital Nedumangadu. Thomas Vilson, HLF PPT Thiruvananthapuram, P K Dhineesh Perithalmanna, Dr. Girish Kumar, Faculty university of Delhi, Dr. Mohanan Das, coordinator N.S.S University of Kerala, Sali.v. Joseph, Assistant Director of Agriculture department Nedumangadu, J Rakesh, sub-inspector, Nedumangadu and Dr. Kiran P S,Nodal officer, National Mental Health Programme, participated in various sections of the camp. The untiring candidates of Nedumangadu College NSS unit organized and participated in many programmes inside and outside college to fulfill the motto of NSS.

NSS Activities for the current year (2013-2014)

Home for the Home less

It is a concept whereby, the NSS volunteers along with the help of Programme officers, Principal, staffs and other local people identify a person who is in need for a home, but is not in a position to afford it. The basic idea is to build a home for an individual, by pooling resources from the college and getting other sponsors for the same.

Snehanidhi

The NSS volunteers plan to collect Rs. 2/ week from all the students and teaching and non-teaching staffs and make it into lumpsum amount and to deposit into the fund of medical treatment of cancer patients.

Comprehensive Vegetable Cultivation

The Vegetable cultivation programme in the college was inaugurated by the MLA Sri. Palode Ravi on 03.10.2013. For this purpose a certain portion of land was identified and different varieties of vegetable seeds were made available by the agricultural department.

5.3.2 the details of major student achievements in co-curricular, extracurricular and cultural activities at different levels: University / State / Zonal / National / International, etc. for the previous four years.

In the academic year 2011-12, our college achieved one Gold medal in Federation cup Kho-Kho championship. Five students have won National level championships in Kho-Kho (Junior and Senior) and Taekwondo and two student have national level participation in Choke ball. Nine students have won state level championships in Kho-Kho (Junior and Senior), Taekwondo and Base ball and thirteen students have achieved University level championships in Kho-Kho, Power lifting, Taekwondo, Boxing and Wrestling.

In the academic year 2012-13, two students have won and two students have participated National level championships in Kho-Kho and Twelve students have achieved state level championships in Kho-Kho (Junior and Senior), and Taekwondo. Ten students have won District level championship and six students have won inter university south zone championship in Kho-Kho. Twenty one students achieved university level championships in Kho-Kho, Taekwondo, shot put and discuss throw. Our students have also been participating in the fine arts competitions in the district, university and state levels every year.

5.3.3 How does the college seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

Each department in our college has its own alumni associations which are convened every year, and the feedback obtained testifies that the exposure provided to the graduates is timely and appreciable. We also receive feedback from the institutions where our graduates are employed, which reinforces our efforts to provide further facilities to our students.

5.3.4 How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine, and other material? List the publications/materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.

A few departments in our college has wall magazines, manuscript magazines, and little magazines. Besides, the college union annually publishes magazines which prove the literary skills of the students and is a record of the cultural, sports and other activities conducted in the college. NSS circulate reading materials to the students on diverse issues of general interest. The Department of Malayalam has recently started a blog, named *MALAYALA VIBHAGAM* (gcnmalayalam.blogspot.com)to provide an outlet for the creative imagination of Students.

5.3.5 Does the college have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

The college has a Student Council consisting of Chair person, Vice Chair person, General Secretary, University Union Councilor, General Captain, Arts Club Secretary and representatives for each year of UG and PGand Association secretaries of different discipline. Notification for College Union Election is announced by the university. They are elected in a parliamentary model by all the enrolled students of the college. A Returning Officer is appointed by the principal as per the recommendations of the college council, and elections are conducted as per the guidelines of Lyngdoh Commission. The Council chalks out the activities in consultation with the Staff Advisor to the students union. The fund collected from the

students at the time of admission forms the main source of fund for their activities. In the event of deficit, additional fund is raised from PTA, and through collection from well-wishers. The General Secretary to the college union is responsible for keeping the accounts. Fine arts secretary is given the charge of identifying the talents and coordinating the cultural activities. General Captain with the support of physical education trainer organizes the Annual Sports Meet and encourages participation of students in sports and games outside the institution at different levels.

5.3.8. How does the institution encourage its students to participate in extracurricularactivities including sports and games? Give details for last two years.

The institution focuses on extra-curricular activities to ensure the all round development of the students. Along with academics students are encouraged toparticipate and organize in extra curricular activities. Most of the programmes are organized by the students union of the college in consultation with the student's staff advisor. They participate in various literary and cultural events. Each department has an association, which provides students to display their talents conduct, competitions and other activities. In addition to Department Associations, Debate Cub, Drama Club, Literary Club, Nature Club, Legal Literacy Cell, Tourism and Film Clubs cater

to student's divergent tastes. The students celebrate Arts club week, Kerala Day, and other national and state festivals.

Students who wish to develop their potential ability in sports and games are identified at the beginning of the year and put under special coaching. The sports students are given extra support to make up for the academic lessons they miss due to practice, training and participation in competitions in various levels such as inter collegiate, state and national. The performance of the students in various sports events is noteworthy and the institution also provides professional trainers and coaches for extra-curricular activities and sports to improve the performance of the students. All these activities provide a good atmosphere to mould the students and help them to become effective functioning members of the society.

The College has been in the frontline in assuring maximum support to the students in the form of scholarships, free ships and other financial assistance. GOVERNANCE AND LEADERSHIP

6.1 **Institutional Vision and Leadership**

State the mission and vision 6.1.1

Vision:

The vision of the college is to impart value based quality education that makes the students intellectually fit and socially committed in every realm of life.

Mission:

- To mould students of the institution into well-meaning citizens of the nation through a socially committed, intellectually inclined, culture driven and future oriented paradigm of learning.
- To empower the students to aspire for significantly contributing to the nation's development through socialist and secular strategies of instruction.
- The institution shall always strive to stride forward and keep pace with the changing needs and spirit of the times. It shall not lounge on its glorious past.
- The college shall continue to foster talent and build on its rich repository of fame and prestige.
- The institution shall continue to uphold its commitment to the nation in general and to the society in particular and perpetually strive to carry this out through a series of carefully crafted, tested and systematically executed steps of actions.
- The institution shall signify learning from the past, assimilating the present and planning for the future.

The Vision statement of the College states that it shall mould students into wellmeaning citizens through carefully crafted designs of education. Its Mission statement asserts that the institution shall spare no pains to change with the needs of the times and that it shall learn from the past, assimilate the present and plan for the future.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The Govt. College, Nedumangad affiliated to the Kerala University is one of the premier institutions of its kind in the state of Kerala. The area, which the college is meant to serve, has a very high economic potential but is educationally backward. Motivated and dedicated Teaching and non-teaching staff, a well organized PTA and disciplined students keep the Government College as a high place of education and culture. Being a College in the government sector, it has to function in conformity with the guidelines laid down by the Government Policy on Higher Education. Checks and balances envisaged by academic and administrative bodies like the College Council and the Academic Council shall have a decisive role to play in the nature of functioning of the College. The curricular and co-curricular activities implied in the vision statement are carried out through the regular ancillary units of the College like the NSS and the NCC.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring?

The administrative functions of the institution are carried out by the Head of the Institution through a consortium of committees at the College and Department levels. Powers are delegated to these different bodies for the smooth functioning of academic and administrative activities with the Principal in a supervisory role. The College Council, Staff Council, Department Staff Councils and the Parent Teacher Association assist the Head of the institution in various activities. Responsibilities are well defined and communicated to the staff through office communications and periodic meetings of the various committees. With the support of the college administration and the College Council, the Principal ensures the involvement of all stakeholders in the effective and efficient transaction of the teaching-learning processes.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

Department Staff Councils discuss the student feedback and overall academic performance in meetings which are promptly and properly recorded. The College Council and the PTA discuss feedback and academic progress, and the minutes of

these meetings are recorded and available for review. A monthly evaluation of students is carried out by the each department.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

Meetings of the College Council, Staff Council, PTA, Advisory Committee of the NSS and the Staff Club, presided over by the principal, are the platforms on which all stakeholders are encouraged to contribute effectively for academic growth.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The Principal is the administrative and academic head of the institution who liaises with the Government and the administrative bodies of education in the State and with the staff and students of the institution. She establishes a rapport with these stakeholders for effective administration of the college.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

Academic merit is given priority in admissions even though reservation is maintained as per rules. The quality policy of the institution is driven home right at the induction program. Continuous appraisal of the performance of the students, teachers and administrative staff is done regularly. The quality policy is reviewed through the feedback of all stakeholders. The administrative functions of the institution are carried out in a participatory manner through committees. Major administrative decisions of the institution are taken in the meetings of the College Council and the College Development Committee. Teaching departments are given autonomy in decisions regarding academic programs. Teaching, evaluation and feedback systems are developed by individual departments taking into consideration the local as well as the global situation.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.


The institution, being affiliated to the University of Kerala, has a somewhat limited role in developing the perspective institutional plan. The College develops

plans to comply with the broad guidelines issued by the University and the Government from time to time for the successful conduct of academic programs. The College Council is the supreme planning body of the institution which discusses and develops institutional plans to match those of the University and Government. Developmental issues of the institution are discussed in the College Development Committee with the District Collector as its Chairman.

The following are the key plans of the institution for the next five years.

- 1. Start more postgraduate and degree programs
- 2. Develop the infrastructure to world standards
- 3. Raise the college to a research centre of the university
- 4. Attract funds for research projects and academic programs.
- 5. Assure scholarships for all students
- 6. Start the construction of the open air auditorium and the compound wall.
- 7. To start the construction of the girls hostel.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.



The College administration is carried out by the Principal with the help of various bodies such as the office, the College Council, the College Development Council, and the Staff Council. Principal delegates duties and responsibilities to these bodies for effective administration.

The College Council is an advisory board that helps the Principal in his academic and administrative functions. It is composed of the Principal, the Heads of Departments, the Librarian and selected faculty. The Council meets periodically to decide upon major academic and administrative issues. The minutes of the Council meetings are circulated among the departments.

The Parent Teacher Association consists of elected members of staff and parents with the Principal as its President and an elected Parent member as the Vice President. The General Body of the PTA meets annually and the Executive Committee members meet periodically to transact business. The PTA fund is utilized for student welfare and for the development of the departments. The College Development Committee, with the District Collector as its Chairman holds periodic meetings to discuss infrastructural development and maintenance of the institution.

The constitution of development committees is as follows:

- 2. Principal of the college Secretary and Treasurer
- 3. One teacher nomiunated by the college council
- 4. The president of the PTA
- 5. The president of the alumni association

The National Service Scheme, the Women's welfare and grievance reddressel cell and the various clubs of the college help in the all-round personality development of the students.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

> Teaching & Learning

We have a number of technology assisted quality improvement strategies in the institution. College's library is well-equipped with 19193 books, 27 journals in addition to the e-books and digital resources, and it is complemented by the department libraries. Modern teaching methods using Wi-Fi broadband internet, INFLIBNET, EDUSAT, interactive boards, LCD projectors and amplifiers and laptop computers are increasingly employed in the classrooms to keep pace with the information explosion round the world. College provides opportunity to the teachers to attend orientation and refresher courses to make improvements in teaching. A Digital Language Lab is set up

to improve the language proficiency among teachers and students. The centralized computing facility enhances the IT skills of our students and facilitates better teaching and learning. Members of the faculty encourage students to acquire knowledge from divergent sources. Thus interactive learning takes place through field work, study tours, group discussions, quizzes, workshops, and academic seminars. GDs, debates and seminars are conducted by all departments. Extension lectures by academic scholars are offered to the students. Academic progress of students is assessed through class tests. The tutorial system helps students to overcome learning difficulties.

> Research & Development

The Research Committee of the college encourages and motivates the teachers to take up research projects, and fosters a culture of research among students and staff. The committee is also involved in synchronising and facilitating research activities carried out by the members of the faculty by providing relevant information, and updates the faculty members on the availability of funds and their sources. Publication of research findings and presentation of research papers are undertaken by the faculty members.

> Community Engagement

Community orientation is a fundamental principle closely followed by the college. The NSS unit organising road safety awareness camps and blood donation campaigns are a few of the activities of the college. The college conducts blood group identification camps every year, and keeps a registry of blood donours, and provides blood to the blood bank and to the needy as and when required.

> Industry Interaction

The college fosters a culture of industry friendliness and creates opportunities for strong interaction of students with industries. The Career Guidance and Placement Cell conducts seminars and workshops in which different industries interact with our students and thus the students get a feel of the demands of the outside job market and the skills they have to develop. Industries also conduct job recruitment drives in the campus and also provide career seminars in association with the college.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

Through the Internal co ordination and monitoring the Head of the institution ensured that the adequate information is available for the top management. To review the activities of the institution the top management coordiates the network involving the College Council, Staff Council and the administration. A two way flow of information takes place between these bodies

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The management encourages the Faculty members to co operate in the areas of student development and student support, sharing expertise acquired through local, national and international training programmes. Teaching departments actively encourage interdisciplinary knowledge-seeking, utilizing faculty from other departments. IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell) takes the initiative in organizing programmes to enable faculty members to share their experience and training.

The Principal is the appellate authority of the institution and all employee grievances received by the Principal are placed before the College Council which decides upon the issue based on facts. The minutes of the College Council are an authentic record of all such grievance redressal. Employee grievances are discussed and settled in an amicable way and there has not been any serious instance of employee dissatisfaction in the institution.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

Yes, in 2012 one of the students was expelled from the institution for exculpating activities inside the college. He filed cases against the college in court and Lokayukta.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Yes, the institution collects feedback on the performance of each teaching faculty, course and the institution and uses the feedback from the students for enhancing the institutional performance, we have the practice of holding meetings of the representatives of various student's organizations and college union members to discuss the issues related to student community. Student feedback, feedback from Class PTA and general PTA meetings and the inputs of the teaching departments to

the College Council are considered in deciding measures to improve academic performance and administrative management.

6.3 FACULTY EMPOWRMENT STRATEGIES

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The institution promotes professional development of the faculty to the greatest possible extent. The Plan fund is utilized for professional development, enabling the teaching departments to organize seminars, conferences and workshops. College provides facility to all the faculty members to attend refresher and orientation courses. All the faculty members are motivated to apply for minor/major projects funded by the UGC and other funding agencies and to pursue research works individually. Faculty members of the institution actively participate in national and international seminars and conferences within India. The institution encourages faculty members to enroll for or provide resources for training programs and workshops. Non teaching staffs are deputed for IMG training programs conducted by the government of Kerala.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

There are relevant rules in place regarding attendance at seminars, conferences, refresher and orientation courses, and other training programs. The need for such training is assessed by Heads of Departments who recommend members of the faculty for such programs. The Government suggests the names of senior faculty who need to be trained for administrative positions when promotions are due. The College has organized seminars, workshops, conferences in various disciplines for its staff as well as for the faculty of other institutions in the state. Government provides fair perks to faculty members on the basis of their nature of work, qualification and designatio

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The institution makes good use of the self appraisal method and comprehensive assessment by students to assess the performance of the faculty and staff. The feedback is communicated to the teachers and staff so that they may make necessary improvements in their performance. Department staff meeting address

specific issues in teaching and learning pointed out by the students, arrives at a consensus regarding the corrective measure required.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

College determines the needs of training and developments on the basis of performance appraisal reports and takes proper decisions regarding training at proper time. The principal and staff council motivate the staff according to their working results and give guidance to the staff. Institution intimates these by way of circulars and notices. In addition to this, staff meeting I s conduct to communicate the matters.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The strategies adopted by the Department of Collegiate Education, Government of Kerala for faculty welfare include monetary and Career Advancement benefits for those with higher qualifications such as M.Phil and PhD as well as opportunities for those who wish to improve their qualifications. There are also government schemes in place to provide loans for those who wish to buy/construct houses or to purchase computers. At the institutional level, the College Council motivates faculty members through prompt appreciation of exceptional merit and talent and by providing opportunities for self expression. The Staff Club of the College is committed to faculty welfare and it offers a platform for the talented and the aspiring.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Institution creates opportunities for self improvement and provides sound working atmosphere to assure job satisfaction among the staff. It helps the institution to attract and retain eminent faculty.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

A college level monitoring committee has been constituted in the college headed by the principal, and the UGC fund utilization under different proposals are entrusted with the co-ordinators concerned, who monitor the implementation process and ensure that the work has completed properly. The fund is disbursed from the office only on the basis of the certification of the work by the co-ordinator concerned. The plan and non plan fund utilisation is made according to the direct monitoring by

the principal. The principal and the office superintendent make sure that the remittances are made in time. For the utilization of the PTA fund, approval of the PTA executive committee is a pre - requisite and the PTA secretary keeps necessary records related to the utilization. The proposals placed before the PTA/principal are evaluated and discussed in the staff council to ensure that the expenditure is only for the developmental activities of the college and the welfare of the students. The utilization of the CDC fund is made according to the approval of the college developmental council headed by the district collector.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

All the accounts of the college are regularly audited. Since the College is a Government institution the accounts are audited by the Collegiate education Department of Government of Kerala and Accountant General of India.

The last audit was conducted from 05/08/2013 to 12/08/2013 by the office of accountant general, and the audit report has not been received so far.

The penultimate audit was from 7/10/2011 to 12/10/2011 by the office of accountant general. The last departmental audit was conducted from 15/11/2011 to 19/11/2011. No serious objections found.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The entire funding for the functioning of the college is done by the government of Kerala. Tuition fees and special fees collected at the time of admission is an important source of institutional receipts, and it is remitted in the government treasury account.

CDC fund is collected at the time of admission and yearly matching grant is allotted to the college by the government of Kerala. The college collects PTA fund as an additional source of internal revenue for carrying out the activities of the college.

Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The Institution is managed by the government of Kerala. All the recurring expenditures are borne by the government agencies. The UGC extends financial support for various academic and developmental activities. Besides PTA and CDC extends financial support. The important grants received in the last four years are given below.

The college campus has developed a plastic free culture in the sense that students and faculty use only recyclable plastic above 50 microns. We do not have plastic waste in the campus beyond a meager amount. We have been constant in our efforts to green the campus, and have formed environment club to foster the culture of eco friendliness. We plant trees in an around the college campus with the help of NSS, and environment club. All these cells make their contribution in greening the campus.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Energy conservation

The college has a lot of electrical equipments which require regular power supply. To reduce our consumption of electricity, we have done away with bulbs and heaters in the campus and have resorted to CFL lights. We have the culture of using energy in a thrifty manner that all the unnecessary connections are disconnected after the class hours and during holidays. Our office monitors that on lights, fans or air conditioners work during off hours and thus we reduce our electricity consumption.

Plastic free campaign

The college does not encourage the use of plastic band flex banners. The students are encouraged to use jute bags carry bags.

The college has a proper waste processing system which generates manure for the plants and garden in the campus.

Efforts for carbon neutrality

Ours is a zero carbon emission campus as we do not use refrigerators, air conditioners and other carbon emitting equipments beyond the permitted scale and point.

7.2.2 Clubs and Activities

1) Scholar Support Programme(SSP)

Scholar Support Programme is implemented in the college to provide personalized additional support to students. Additional lectures and interactive sessions are organized in the college and the pupils are provided study materials and question banks. Students with <60% marks for their qualifying exam are selected for the programme. The number of students selected from the college are limited to a maximum of 50. Based on result analysis six week subjects at college level are identified and the students are given additional support to improve their performance in the weak subjects.

2) Fostering Linkages in Academic Innovation and Research(FLAIR)

Newly joined faculty members of the college, who have less than five years of service and at least 20 years of service have applied to become FLAIR members. The programme is aimed at motivating faculty members to adopt innovative teaching-learning and research strategies. It also aims to bring quality consciousness in the field of higher education through meaningful interventions in academics and research. The programme also envisages establishment of web based networks of academicians called 'Collaborative Academic Networks' (CAN) for knowledge sharing.

3) Career Guidance and Counseling

A career guidance cell functions in the college, aimed at notifying the students about competitive exams, options in higher education and placement opportunities through seminars, lectures, demonstrations, brochures etc.. The counseling centre offers advice and psychological guidance to help students to

overcome the stress and strains of adolescence and to strengthen them mentally.

4) Anti – Ragging Cell

As per the order of the Supreme Court, an anti-ragging squad is constituted in the college, aiming to prevent ragging. The cell also arranges awareness programme on ragging and related issues.

Anti-Ragging Cell is formed at the institution with the objective to curb-out ragging. UGC has framed regulations, on curbing ragging in higher educational institution, in order to prohibit, prevent and eliminate the scourge of ragging

13) Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP)

It aims at creating employment opportunities for the unemployed youth, enhancement of skill sets of the labour force, emphasizing industry linkage and enhancing employability of students. Expertise of industry organizations like, NASSCOM, CII, FICCI and various Sector Skill Councils set up by the National Skill Development Mission will be sought for the Programme. The Programme will be focussing on additional skillacquisition, through a series of activity based modules including Communication, Information Technology, Skills etc., defined by the Industry so as to ensure that the students passing out of the institution have employable skills that are required by labour market and the industry, nationally and internationally.

The ASAP program at our college was launched on 06.03.2013 with the presence of Sri.Palode Ravi, MLA as chief guest. ASAP classes are arranged in every working day from 9am to 10 am and alsoin some saturdays, if necessary. So far we have completed 140 hrs of training and 30 students of our college are getting its benefit.

14) Literacy Club

The aim of this club is to find the percentage of e-literacy at Nedumangadu Municipality and evolve strategies to equip the community with basic skills in e-literacy. This club is functioning with the following objectives in mind

- To identify the percentage of people who are not e-literate
- Explore the possibility of providing regular training through 'Akshaya' centres.
- Exclude the fear from the community in approaching new technology.

We have planned some activities like

Edusat is a facility provided by the Dept. of collegiate Education, Govt. of Kerala for providing live classes to students and teachers. Classes are conducted by the experts in the relevant field, on every Tuesday and Thursday at 11 A.M, at the main studio, Sansktit College campus, Thiruvananthapuram. Teachers are also getting opportunity for handling classes. During class time, students can directly interact with the resource person.

14) **Entry into Service**

'Entry into Service Scheme' provide coaching for various competitive examinations. In this academic year, 28 classes have been conducted. More than 50 students get the benefit of the scheme. Classes are handled by the professors of our college and experts from other educational institutions.

BEST PRACTICE -1

1. Title of the Practice:

E-learning and Administration

2. Goal

- Use the internet for resource mobilisation.
- Facilitate access to information
- Administrative reforms

The college has set wi-fi broadband internet connection for all Departments, administrative sections and library. The college offers INFLIBNET facility supported by high speed Wi-Fi Internet connectivity and EDUSAT facility which provide sufficient exposure to our advanced learners. This connectivity has positively impacted all realms of the institution. Administration has shifted to e-mode, students have begun to browse and access information using the net and the teachers have begun to use the internet for resource mobilisation. All the departments offering core subject are provided with a laptop desktops, laser printer with scanner and LCD projector .All the PG class rooms are turned into smart class rooms. The setting up of a Language Laboratory and Edusat Centre has helped the students to keep pace with modern technology in the teaching-learning process.

3. The Context

Even though the College is located in a remote area Our College is capable of providing all the necessary things for the furnishing of these facilities. The College provides adequate training to staffs and students. Adapting to blogging as a teaching/learning tool has been a slow one and is still in the progressing phase.

4. The Practice

The broad band internet wi fi connectivity and INFLIBNET facility and its use in teaching and administration is one of the strong points considering the educational and general backward status of the rural area in which the college located. Being a college in a rural area, the connectivity offers an opportunity for students to have hands on experience in using technology, web/networks, blogging, communicating with emails etc, which are essential components of a student's knowledge domain. The connectivity provides a great opportunity for the staff to update subject related developments. INFLIBNET in the library, IT lab, Language lab and the Edusat room are platforms from which the facility can be tapped. Resource sharing by teachers using the internet helps build the rapport among staff, thus building team spirit and the collaboration which can be the backbone of a learning institution. In the administrative sector, data/record keeping and communication skills have shown an upward curve. The concept and promotion of the use of smart classrooms has also been another positive development in this line.

5. Evidence of Success

It provides pace and effectiveness in teaching learning process. The administrative process and document exchanges with in the college and with the affiliated University through internet eased and secured the process.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The uneven nature of the terrain, location of different departments in different blocks and lack of funds considering the huge initial investment were the significant hurdles. wi-fi connection and other smart class room facilities, in all class rooms is another milestone to be achieved whereby teaching approaches can be directed more towards differentiated tasks and instructions. For optimal use of the available resources and to tap technology completely, more training is inevitable for both staff and students. The college has a shortage of technical experts to handle this aspect. To minimise time and labour, e-administration is necessary.

BEST PRACTICE - 2

1. Title of the Practice:

Walk With A Scholar Programme

2. Goal:

- Provide necessary orientation to the students to prepare for employment
- Necessary guidance to select areas for higher study.
- Guidance for their future

Walk With a Scholar (WWS) scheme proposes to arrange specialized mentoring programs for students in Under Graduate Programs in Arts, Science and Commerce and to provide necessary orientation to prepare for employment or necessary guidance for their future. The scheme introduces the idea of mentoring and builds on the concept of mentor as a 'Guide' and 'Friend'.

3. The Context:

The mentoring scheme for students will be purely voluntary in nature. It will be open for all students entering the first year of the Under Graduate Programme of Study. The Scheme aims at giving necessary orientation to needy students, to prepare them for employment and give them necessary guidance, motivation and necessary mental support to identify appropriate areas for higher study as well as employment. The programme introduces the idea of mentoring. Mentoring is a personal enhancement strategy through which one person facilitates the development of another by sharing known resources, expertise, values, skills, perspectives, attitudes and proficiencies. It allows the learner to build skills and knowledge while attaining goals for career development

4. The Practice:

The initial works of the programme were started in the last week of November, 2012. The College Council selected Dr. L. ALEX, Asst. Professor of Malayalam as the college level coordinator. A notice was served and a briefing of the programme has been done by the Coordinator in all the first semester under-graduate classes. As much as 30 students from

different disciplines were registered. The programme is aimed to provide necessary orientation, guidance and motivation to the students so as to enrich their talents for higher studies and better employment. Its target is to develop certain generic skills, non-technical competencies, attitudes and behaviors that contribute to a person's *sense of self* and personal well-being. The programme is designed in such a manner as to inculcate the potential skills and capabilities of the students. Sessions were arranged on Saturdays and Holidays without affecting the normal academic routine of the students and the college.

Details of Internal Mentoring:

Primarily, students are grouped on the basis of the subject they chose for undergraduation. The science students are allotted to the internal mentor from the faculty of science, commerce students are allotted to the internal mentor from the faculty of commerce, History and Economics students are allotted to the internal mentors from the faculties of humanities and Language students are allotted to the internal mentor from their own faculty.

The department of Physics started in 2004 has now become an emerging department in the field of academic excellence and research. The department is presently offering BSc (Physics with Computer Application Course). It is a career related course, providing opportunities to students for opting higher studies in Physics as well as IT. Some students are getting employment in IT field, just after BSc course. The department has well equipped laboratory, wi fi internet facility for students and teachers and computer aided teaching using ICT facilities. Department has competent teachers to do teaching and research with excellence.

Out of three teaching posts, only one post is sanctioned and for the two post guest faculty is available. No technical staff (Lab Assistant) is available and the smooth conduct of laboratory work is difficult. For the present course, students have limited opportunity for entering into teaching field. They can go for BEd degree only after completing PG course. The department has got NOC for starting PG course from the University of Kerala. But the sanction from government is still pending.

Nedumangad is now becoming a hub for astronomical and space research. Several institutes of national importance like IISER, IIST and VSSC are very near to our college. Upgrading the department to PG and research department is the present challenge. The department has a heavy and great responsibility to make the students from ordinary family, competent enough for higher studies and research so that they can grab opportunities from their vicinity.
